BETH MEAD HAIKU POEM

Haiku is a style of poem which originated in **Japan**. Your challenge is to write a haiku poem about **Beth Mead** and her spectacular goals. **Watch this video** to see some of her best goals, then have a go at a Haiku!

A haiku has **three lines**. There can be any number of words, but the first line must have **five syllables**. Then second line must have **seven syllables** and the third line must have **five syllables**. Haikus do not need to rhyme.

Each **syllable** is a group of letters which make up one sound or 'beat'. E.g. Arsenal is 1 word but has 3 **syllables**. There are 3 beats when you say it: Ars-en-al.



HAIKU STRUCTURE:

First line = 5 syllables Second line = 7 syllables Third line = 5 syllables

HAIKU EXAMPLE:

Beth shoots from way out. Leaving the keeper stranded. Another stunner.

You can either write your haiku poem on plain paper or our Writing Template.



DESCRIPTIVE – In your poem, try to describe Beth's goals or the type of player she is.

IMAGINATIVE - Try to be creative. You could use: similes, metaphors, personification, alliteration, etc.

CHECK YOUR SYLLABLES – Count the syllables or beats once you have finished. Have you got the correct amount?
