We are all devastated after Thursday's defeat at the Emirates.

ike everyone I'm sure, we were really, really down at the final whistle. We wanted to deliver something for this football club and get to the final. We wanted to go through and win it, get in the Champions League next season and give something to our fans. Unfortunately though we came up short.

We had moments in the second half – we hit the post, then we had an empty goal to put the ball in the net. So those small margins can define these ties and on Thursday we came up short – we were on the wrong side of those margins.

I think there are so many reasons for the performance, and many things went against us. We had to play some players that have been injured for a long time. They weren't able to train much before we had to use them on Thursday evening.

In the warm-up we lost one of our main players in Granit, so we had to change the game plan at the very last minute.

I think we suffered in the first half with the ball because we weren't strong enough in the first phase. We made it difficult for ourselves, we looked like we were in a rush with no time or composure.

We changed it in the second half though and we looked much better. We created enough chances, certainly more than them. I think from that respect we deserved to win the game, from what we produced, but we couldn't score that defining goal.







When you lose a semi-final or a final you'll always have regrets. There will always be things you wanted to do differently.

What it comes down to is that we didn't play at our best over the two legs. Certainly in the first half an hour in Villarreal in the first leg and the first half at the Emirates, we were not at our best. But even still, we were in the tie after all that, and we could have been easily through to the final.

We fought until the end and we could have won the game 1-0, and that would have been enough to

But we didn't arrive individually in the best possible way in the defining moments, those moments when the big players have to step up.

We have four games left now this season, and now is not the time to make conclusions from this year yet. We need to look ahead.

Yes, on Thursday we had to swallow a huge disappointment for everybody but we had a terrific run in the competition with the very difficult teams that we had.

Now we have another home game today and our responsibility is to go and win these remaining Premier League games and give us a chance to see where we finish.

We have to pick ourselves up. We have to be ready to fight again. We'll analyse what we did on Thursday, but I'm telling you, we arrived in these moments not in the best condition and that's one of the reasons why we went out.

During those defining moments, we didn't put the ball in the net when it mattered.

That cost us. It cost us the tie in the end and now we are out of the competition.

It's my job now to pick these players up. I'm convinced I can do that and we can finish the season strongly.



But now it's not about talking, it's about showing it on the pitch. That's our challenge now, starting tonight

Lastly, I want to join everyone here at Arsenal in celebrating the 50 year anniversary of the double the team achieved in 1970/71. An amazing achievement, from an amazing group of footballers. It is something Arsenal supporters still talk about with great warmth and pride and I think it is great that everyone at the club is commemorating this special anniversary.■

Thursday night was incredibly disappointing for everyone at the club.

e knew we had a great chance to progress in the competition and get to the final in Poland – and then to try to reach our objective of winning a trophy. But it just didn't happen for us.

We struggled to find our rhythm in the first-half and didn't give Villarreal enough problems. And when we had a chance, the luck wasn't there for us, when I hit the post with the volley and then the header in the second half.

I thought we started the second half with more energy and put them under pressure, but we just couldn't maintain that drive and ultimately, we just didn't find a way through Villarreal. I thought my header was in when it hit the post, but it just wasn't going to happen.

Like I said, we are really upset about going out of the competition at this stage, for ourselves, for the club and most of all for you the supporters. It's been such a difficult season for fans and we desperately wanted to give you something positive this season — I'm just so sorry we couldn't do it for you.

I have had a really difficult time with my illness in the last few weeks, but now at last I feel close to being 100 per cent. In my mind I have felt good and ready for a while, but physically it was really tough.


In fact I would say it was the worst moment of being sick in my life. I had fever for three days in a row – all day and all night – and the paracetamol was having no

effect. So we decided I needed to go to hospital, I was very down and lost four kilos in weight. It was a difficult moment and I think my family was a bit scared to see me like that. I'm very thankful for the treatment I received, the doctors and all the staff did a great job, and as I say, I am ready to lead the team again now.

So for a few reasons, definitely this has been the most difficult season for me of the past few years. I had some tough times at the start of my career as well, but that's life – you need to keep focussing and keep working.

It's true that it has been difficult for me this season, off the pitch as well, but you have to accept criticism when it comes. Of course it hurts — like it would anybody, I'm a human being. Everybody was looking for me to score more goals this season. I know that, I'm aware of that, and so maybe I feel responsible for the situation we are in this season.

I'm very motivated to finish the Premier League season strongly. I always demand more from myself, I know I can do better, and hopefully I've still got time to show that this year. Of course I have some regrets about how things have gone this season, and as I said I feel responsible too for that, so I want to take the lead and give something back to the club and the fans. I know everybody is waiting for something from me, and I am desperate to do that.

I'm the captain, everybody looks to me to lead on the pitch, I want that responsibility, I like that responsibility on my shoulders, and it's time to repay that faith that

everybody has shown in me.


I really hope this is the last game we play at the Emirates with no fans inside. It's been a really, really difficult time for a lot of people, and for me as well it was tough. I'm used to seeing my family quite often, because they come to every single home game at the Emirates, and I love to have them there. And the fans as well. We want to see people back at the stadium because I think I'm a player who needs these emotions inside the stadium. I need the energy from the fans to help me perform better, and so I can't wait to have some of you back for our last game, and then looking forward to next year — we all hope it can be a much, much better year.

Lastly, I know that we are celebrating 50 years since the team won the league and FA Cup double in 1970/71. As players we know this achievement was an extremely difficult thing to do and those players must have been very special. We still see the pictures around the club of this team and they – like all of the amazing teams from the past who have played for Arsenal – inspire us to strive to bring more success to the club.

THIERRY HENRY INDUCTED TO THE PREMIER LEAGUE HALL OF FAME

rsenal legend Thierry Henry has been named in the official Premier League Hall of Fame. He is joined as one of the first two inductees by Premier League record goalscorer Alan Shearer.

The Hall of Fame recognises and celebrates the exceptional skill and talent of individuals who have graced the Premier League since its inception in 1992. I is the highest individual honour awarded to players by the League.

Thierry won the Premier League's Golden Boot award a record four times and scored a club record 175 Premier League goals in 258 appearances for Arsenal. He netted more than 20 Premier League goals in five consecutive seasons between 2001 and 2006. He is also our all-time leading scorer with 228 goals.

He won the Premier League title twice and was a key member of the 'Invincibles' team which went unbeaten during the 2003/04 title-winning season. Along with his scoring prowess, the Frenchman contributed 74 assists during eight Premier League seasons, including a joint-record 20 in 2002/03.

"To be inducted alongside Alan Shearer as the two first inductees into the Premier League Hall of Fame is more than special," said Thierry

"When I was young, I was just trying to make sure I could get a pair of boots and now we're talking about the



Hall of Fame. During my career I wanted to play hard and make sure I was fighting for the cause, because that's all the fans want to see. If you asked me at the start of my career about entering the Hall of Fame, I wouldn't have believed you. It's an amazing honour."

Premier League Chief Executive Richard Masters said:
"Alan Shearer and Thierry Henry are two world-class
players who lit up the Premier League throughout their
time in the competition. Both players were capable of
scoring every kind of goal, including some of the best we
have ever seen.

"Henry broke individual and team records during eight seasons with Arsenal when he became a footballing icon. He was a talisman in the 'Invincibles' team and his four Premier League Golden Boots during a five-year period reflect the impact he had."

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

MO GOES TOP

Mohamed Elneny now tops the appearances table for Arsenal in Europa League history. He came on as a late substitute against Villarreal in the first leg, to make what was his 31st outing in the competition for the Gunners. He's scored three times in those 31 games – all long-range efforts – against BATE Borisov, Dundalk and Olympiacos. The Egyptian midfielder also appeared in the competition for previous side Basle, and he's played 56 Europa League games in total – only four players (Daniel Carrico, Andreas Ulmer, Jeremain Lens and Senad Lulic) have played more.


Victory for Arsenal would see West Bromwich Albion relegated from the Premier League for a joint-record fifth time (along with Norwich). It would be their 11th top-flight relegation (only Birmingham with 12 have suffered more), while it would be manager Sam Allardyce's first relegation from the Premier League.

West Bromwich Albion have lost more top-flight matches against Arsenal (65) than they have versus any other side in their history, with 39 of those defeats arriving in London.

West Bromwich Albion manager Sam Allardyce has lost 17 Premier League games against Arsenal (W5 D7), only losing more games in the competition versus Manchester City (18). In fact, Allardyce has never won an away game against Arsenal in the Premier League (D3 L11), losing on each of his last nine visits.

Pierre-Emerick Aubameyang became the sixth Arsenal player to score 10+ goals in each of their first four Premier League seasons with the club after Ian Wright, Dennis Bergkamp, Thierry Henry, Olivier Giroud and Alexandre Lacazette. The Gabonese striker has also had a hand in 20 goals in 17 Premier League appearances against newly promoted teams (16 goals, 4 assists).

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SIX KEY MOMENTS

Arsenal Historian Jon Spurling pinpoints six moments from the 1970/71 double season that proved key to the Gunners' success

DIVISION ONE

AUGUST 22, 1970 HIGHBURY ARSENAL 4 Radford 3, Graham MANCHESTER UNITED o


fter starting the season with two draws, Arsenal romped to victory against the visitors in front of the Match Of The Day cameras, and an enormous 54,117 crowd. Star of the show was Gunners striker John Radford, who helped himself to a hat trick, ably assisted by burly forward Ray Kennedy, drafted into the starting line up after Charlie George broke his ankle in the 2-2 draw against Everton on the opening day of the campaign. George Graham, now deployed in midfield, also scored with a trademark header, and goalkeeper Bob Wilson made a memorable save from George Best, plucking the ball away from the Ulsterman at the last minute as he looked certain to score. "The victory was a huge morale booster," recalled Wilson, "and set us up superbly for what proved to be the most memorable of campaigns."

EUROPEAN FAIRS CUP FIRST ROUND

SEPTEMBER 16, 1970 STADIO OLIMPICO

LAZIO 2 Chinaglia 2 (1 pen) ARSENAL 2 Radford 2

The Fairs Cup clash with Lazio, played out in a fiery Stadio Olimpico, ended 2-2, with John Radford grabbing two fine goals. But it was the clash between the players from both teams afterwards, following a banquet in a Roman restaurant, which really grabbed the headlines, and cemented the Gunners' team spirit. The street brawl - instigated by Lazio players - threatened to get out of hand, before manager Bertie Mee strode forwards, ushering his players onto the team coach. The Gunners players defended one another to the hilt, and Bertie Mee spoke years later of how the incident in Rome "further cemented team spirit at the club." Keen to ensure that the second leg passed off without incident, UEFA appointed 1970 World Cup referee Rudi Glockner to officiate. The East German official booked five Lazio players, but Radford and George Armstrong scored to ease Arsenal into the second round, following the comfortable 2-0 home win.



FA CUP SEMI-FINAL

MARCH 27, 1971 HILLSBOROUGH ARSENAL 2 Storey 2 (1 pen)

STOKE CITY 2 Ritchie, Smith

If ever a match summed up the indomitable spirit of the 70/71 double-winning side, it was the epic semi-final clash at Hillsborough. Seemingly down and out to Tony Waddington's lively and skilful Stoke side, Arsenal snatched a draw from the jaws of defeat with a late Peter Storev inspired comeback, Goals from John Ritchie and Denis Smith gave Stoke a 2-0 half time lead, and if Potters forward Jimmy Greenhoff had hit the target instead of blasting the ball high into the Spion Kop, the tie would surely have been dead and buried. But the Gunners somehow fought back. Storey blasted a powerful half volley past Gordon Banks to reduce the deficit, and then, with time almost up, Storey kept his cool to steer a penalty past the England goalkeeper to grab Arsenal what seemed an impossible 2-2 draw. A disheartened Stoke lost the replay 2-0, as Arsenal reached their first FA Cup final for 19 years.

APRIL 17, 1971 HIGHBURY

ARSENAL 1 George



Arsenal flat lined their way to a 1-0 win on no fewer than 10 occasions in the league in '70/71, but the victory over Newcastle encapsulated the Gunners' ability to nab vital victories despite not being on top of their game. On a bumpy Highbury pitch, Arsenal looked laboured and ponderous on occasions, but Charlie George's much televised scorching half volley which flew past Liam McFaul









secured two precious points for Bertie Mee's side on the day that title rivals Leeds United slipped up at home against West Bromwich Albion. Three days later, in another desperately tight Highbury clash, George blasted home from the penalty spot to condemn visitors Burnley to relegation in another 1-0 win. "By that stage of the season," George explained, "it was all about holding your nerve."

DIVISION ONE

MAY 3, 1971 WHITE HART LANE TOTTENHAM o ARSENAL 1 Kennedy

With an estimated 50,000 disappointed fans locked out, Arsenal locked horns with their north London rivals at White Hart Lane in the ultimate derby match which decided the destiny of the 1971 Division One title. In a tense match, Arsenal prodded and probed, knowing that they needed a goalless draw or a win to snatch the prize. With 89 minutes gone, George Armstrong delivered a pinpoint cross for Ray Kennedy, who headed home high past Tottenham (and future Arsenal) goalkeeper Pat Jennings to secure Arsenal's first league title for 18 years. Gunners players and fans

celebrated the team completing the first leg of the historic double long into the night, and although the remaining footage of the clash is grainy, the memory burns brightly half a century later.

FA CUP FINAL

MAY 8, 1971 WEMBLEY

ARSENAL 2 Kelly, George

LIVERPOOL 1 Heighway (AFTER EXTRA-TIME)

On a boiling Wembley afternoon, Arsenal won the FA Cup after battling back from going a goal down to Steve Heighway's opportunistic strike early in the first period of extra-time. After 101 minutes, Eddie Kelly's flick appeared to have been guided home by fellow Scot George Graham, but replays showed that Kelly had the final touch. There was no doubt about the goal that won the double. Ten minutes after Kelly's equaliser, John Radford slipped the ball to Charlie George, and the former North Bank regular drove home from 20 yards past a despairing Ray Clemence. His iconic 'Jesus Christ Superstar' celebration has been much discussed in the years since, with George explaining it thus: "I was out on my feet and needed a lie down."

FIRST HALF

After 41 league games the First Division campaign all came down to the final match of the season, at White Hart Lane of all places, the home of our local rivals. We went into the game knowing that a win, or a goalless draw, would be enough to pip Leeds at the top of the table and earn our first league title for 18 years. Even a scoring draw would not be enough, as Leeds would be crowned champions on goal average. Martin Peters clipped the bar early on for Tottenham in front of 51,992, but Charlie George and George Graham went close for Arsenal as we began to take control.

SECOND HALF

Ray Kennedy came close to opening the scoring in the second half. He was lurking in the right place when a Spurs half-clearance fell to him outside the area, but his powerful leftfoot shot ended up with the fans behind the goal. The 19-year-old did not have to wait long for his moment of glory though. We had been knocking at the door throughout the second period, only to find Pat Jennings in fine form in the Spurs goal. Eventually however, the goal came - with just two minutes remaining. George Armstrong stood a cross up from the left wing near the byline and Kennedy, just outside the six yard box, rose to head into the roof of the net. The hosts poured forward in search of the equaliser that would deny us, but Bob Wilson's safe handling calmed our nerves and we held on to claim a record eighth title.■

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Challenge it. Report it. Change it.

Very few people in the history of the game know the feeling of winning the league and FA Cup double in English football.

ewer still have experienced winning it more than once, as both a player and a coach, in different generations. But Pat Rice belongs to that most exclusive of clubs. Having joined the club as an apprentice aged 15, his breakthrough in the first team came five years later, when he became a regular at right back at the start of the 1970/71 season. A fully committed, whole-hearted defender, he missed just one game all campaign, forming part of a miserly back four that conceded only 29 games from 42 league games. He was ever-present in the FA Cup run, getting his hands on the trophy that he would go on to win again as a player in 1979, and four more times as firstteam coach alongside Arsène Wenger. The first of those was in 1998 - Arsenal's second double - and four years later he was at it again, as the Gunners became the first club ever to win three doubles in three different decades. Now, on the 50th anniversary of that legendary win in 1971, Pat looks back on that historic achievement, and tells us the secret of the side's success.

What's the first thing you think of when you remember the 1971 season?

For me the first memory that comes into my mind, and it may seem strange, but I remember the team sheet for the game at White Hart Lane going up at Highbury the day before the game, and it said report time was 3 o'clock. We all thought that was strange because kick-off wasn't until 7.3opm I think, and it's only down the road, because we used to get the bus from Southgate. Anyway, the next day when we all got on the coach, there were cars absolutely everywhere. It was just amazing and at one stage it looked



like we wouldn't make the game in time, even though we had left three hours early. Tottenham High Road especially was rammed — it was like every Arsenal fan had taken the day off work. So it looked like we weren't going to make it. The coach had to drive up on the kerb, and then we saw some of the wives and girlfriends of the players, so we stopped to pick them up as well! Anyway, I think we got into the dressing room eventually only about 30 minutes before kick-off. It was unbelievable.

What were your emotions before that game? Did being late make you more tense?

It wasn't ideal preparation maybe, but by then we were just thinking about the game. We knew what we had to do, we knew defensively that we were strong and you couldn't really see them scoring. We knew if we played to our ability, they wouldn't score, and that's what happened. It's a great

feeling to have that confidence. That was the way I felt about it anyway.

That was your breakthrough season, you became a regular at the age of 21...

That's right, it's the way it happened. The first game of the season was Everton away, and what normally happened is that Peter Storey was moved into midfield to pick up Alan Ball, so I came in to play at right back. Well we drew that game, then we played at West Ham on the Tuesday, Peter went back to right back and I was out of the team. We drew o-o I think, and then after that they went back to using Peter in midfield, so I got the spot at right back, and basically kept my place there from then on. So it was due to the fact that we had played Everton in the first game that the double-winning system or formation came to fruition.

That West Ham game was the only game you missed throughout the double, how did you cope with playing every few days?

Well it was certainly better than training! There were a few of us who played near enough every game. And training was never light between the games either — not with Don Howe! No chance, we trained how we played, it was always full commitment. We had so many big personalities in the team though. Our captain, Frank, was an unbelievable personality. The word defeat never came into his vocabulary. So for me as a young guy, to have these guys like John Radford, Peter Simpson, Bob McNab — who was an unbelievable character too, as well as being a terrific full back. For me it was a great learning process and hopefully one that I made the most of.

When did you get the feeling during the season that you could achieve something special? The double had only been won once in the previous 70 years at that point...

To be perfectly truthful, we didn't really think about it. We just went into every game, and, first of all, tried not to be beaten. If you can't win the game, don't lose it. That was our motivation. And with those players I mentioned, we had real winners. You know how people say teams have a winning mentality, well that's what we had. We had George Graham, Bob Wilson, Ray Kennedy, George Armstrong too.

These guys had come up the hard way. Some of them would have had jobs too when they first started playing. So it was very different. That's not to say they wouldn't have made it if it was like it is today, but it was the way they were brought up and might explain the mentality.

Everyone remembers the game that clinched the title at White Hart Lane, but what other games stood out for you that season?

I remember beating West Bromwich Albion 6-2 at Highbury one weekend. When we came in to training on the Monday, Don Howe called a meeting. He brought us in to the Halfway House, which was a small room halfway down the old tunnel at Highbury where we held player meetings. We went into the meeting feeling good after a big win, but then Don absolutely laid into us all. He must have gone on for 45 minutes - it was untrue. The reason he was so mad was he wanted to know how the smallest player on the pitch had headed both goals for West Brom. That was the kind of ruthlessness that came through the whole team.

What are your recollections of the cup final? The players looked completely exhausted in the footage, how demanding was that game to play in?

Going into that game, from my point of view anyway, I knew that at least we had already won the league. All of our



efforts that season had been rewarded with the title, so my personal feeling was that at least we have already got some silverware to show for it. So we went into the game as champions, and from my point of view the pressure was off. But yes the game was tough. I'll always remember after the game, I asked our physio to go up and get my medal for me because I was too tired to do it! He talked me out of it thankfully. We were so exhausted though, it was a really hot day too, and of course we were against a top-class side in Liverpool. Both sides had individual players who could win games - and one of them was Charlie. We knew what he could do because we saw it all the time in training. He scored goals like that often, so we were elated when he did it at Wembley, but we weren't surprised.

How does it feel to realise this was all 50 years ago?!

It is crazy really, because all I've got to do is look in the mirror and I'm as beautiful as I ever was!

Do you keep in touch with the other guys on the


Yeah, I spoke to Sammy yesterday actually, and I did a podcast with Bob the other day. Frank doesn't live far from me, and George too, so I see them still. We always try to get together once a year as a team as well.

You won the double again as part of the coaching staff in 1998, then in 2002. Did you ever speak to those players about the first double and your role in it?

I'm not the kind of guy to talk about what I've won in the past. In fact it wasn't until Bob Wilson told me that I realised I have been involved in more trophy successes for Arsenal than anyone else, as a player or coach. So I never really spoke to the players about it myself, but if they ever asked me about it I would tell them.

Do you believe that the club's past achievements can inspire the next generations?

Yes I think the players can, it comes down to them. Speaking personally, playing alongside somebody like



Back in 1971 were you inspired by previous Arsenal sides? Did everybody talk about the team of the 1930s back then?

Yes, but really it was in 1970 when we won the Fairs Cup against Anderlecht that was the big moment for us, because then we had matched the achievements of the past. All the photos that were up of the boy Bastin, the great Alex James and others, they could all be taken down because we had made our own history and had our own success that could be celebrated. We all desperately hope there is more to come now from the current generation, and they can go on to add their own piece of history for the club.

3pm • Saturday, May 8, 1971 • Wembley Stadium

FIRST HALF

After a nervy start by both sides, Liverpool, coming into the game after finishing fifth in the table, began to look dangerous on a hot, sunny afternoon at a packed Wembley Stadium. But our defence, as so often this season, stood firm, marshalled by Footballer of the Year Frank McLintock. It was becoming an increasingly tactical battle, forcing Charlie George to take aim from 25 yards, but his shot sailed over. Ray Clemence then saved well from a George Armstrong header, after he was found by John Radford. At the other end Bob Wilson denied Alec Lindsay to keep it goalless at the break.

SECOND HALF

As the match progressed, the hot conditions began to take their toll on both sets of players. Radford fired straight at Clemence after superbly shifting the ball onto his right foot inside the area, before George Graham headed against the bar from close range, getting on the end of a long Radford throw in. From the resulting corner Lindsay scrambled the ball away off the line and the game became more stretched in the closing stages. Wilson made a couple of late vital stops to ensure extra-time.

EXTRA-TIME

Just two minutes into extra-time Steve Heighway finally broke the deadlock, beating Wilson at his near post from a tight angle inside the box. We responded well though and levelled at the end of the first period. Substitute Eddie Kelly prodded a shot goalwards, George Graham failed to make contact but either way it was in the Liverpool net. With less than ten minutes remaining, we got the winner. George fired home a rocket from 20 yards, giving Clemence no chance, to win the cup and seal a stunning league and cup double.

I WAS THERE!

Tony Wickenden is one of the lucky fans who saw us win at White Hart Lane and at Wembley – he recalls a very special season

I'm 67 and from south London, our original home of course! The Arsenal was my dad's team — he brought me up 'right' so to speak, by taking me to home games with his pals Vic, Richie and Mickey. My dad remains 'at home' as his ashes are in the ground at Highbury at the North Bank end. What a brilliant club we are to allow that to happen. Class. My wife Pauline is a season ticket holder with me and our three boys (well, men now) Phil, James and Chris. We are all in the North Upper at the Emirates.

Before the 1970/71 season, I'd been going for six years, my first game was against Wolves on August 24 1963. I was nine. We stood on the West Lower. I was ushered down to the front by the wall with my little

wooden collapsible stool to get a better view. I also had a pretty hefty rattle! We lost 3-1, but I got to see my then favourite Alan Skirton and mydad's favourite, George Eastham. I never looked back. In my teens I was mostly on the North Bank.

As for the '70/71 season, I remember there was expectation about what we might achieve — always a dangerous thing! Bertie Mee's team — and me as a fan — had been to successive league cup finals in '68 and '69 and lost both of them (even against Swindon, no offence! But that night at Highbury in April 1970 when we beat Anderlecht and won the Fairs Cup was one of the best ever. I'm ashamed (and a bit proud too) to say I was one of those many thousands celebrating on the

pitch after the game. At that point anything seemed possible.

I got to all but two home games in the '70/71 season and a few away games with the supporters' club when I could afford it — what brilliant value the coaches were. The building sense of excitement and possibility after Christmas was something that gave a constant extra buzz to normal life. The sense that something unbelievable was possible, accompanied by projecting how you would feel if it didn't happen.


As for most things in life, the truly memorable things are what stick most vividly with you and for me there are four in 1971:

- **1.** I met my wife of 46 years (and fellow Gooner) at the Fellowship Inn in Bellingham.
- 2. The semi-final replay at Villa Park on March 31.
- **3.** The night of May 3 at Spurs the first of two league wins there.
- 4. The FA Cup final on May 8.

The semi-final replay was the day after my 17th birthday and my mum wrote me a note to get me off school 'severe tooth pain and headache'. I went with my mate Stevie Proctor who fancied the day off too. We went to Euston on my Lambretta so we'd have transport home when we got back from Villa Park. What a night! And the start of the anticipation of the final and the worry about whether I would get a ticket.

You had to have all the little vouchers from the programme to affix to your application and I was two short. I bought the two missing programmes at the Arsenal Shop in Avenell Road and my chemistry teacher showed me how to remove the 'invalid' stamp without damaging the voucher. Best science lesson ever! OK, it's out there. Banged to rights as they say, but I felt justified as I'd missed those games for good reasons: illness and a family wedding. Fingers crossed I wasn't caught. But before the final there was the little matter of the league to win at Spurs. Mum to the rescue again. Another tooth-related note. An urgent dental appointment this time. At least there was some consistency in my ill-health!

Barry Lovell and I got to the ground at about 11.30am to queue to get in. That road leading to the Park Lane End was absolutely rammed from early afternoon. At one point we had to climb over a car to keep moving forward. We were among the lucky ones to get in – there must have been nearly 50,000 outside. Ray Kennedy's goal

two minutes from the end left me literally on my knees as the crowd swayed forward. I had a mixture of ecstasy and fear that has never been reproduced. What a night. I was there with my wife and boys when 'it happened again', but that first night was special.

My cup final ticket arrived the next day. Result! The wonder of science. Barry didn't have enough vouchers so I went on my own but from Baker Street I was with a massive Gooner family. A beautiful day with a beautiful goal to win it. 'Born is the King of Highbury!' More hugging of fellow Gooners and off to Trafalgar Square and the fountains.

Magical, magical times, with more to come under Arsène (Merci Monsieur!) and hopefully, Mikel.■



MY The Arsenal Foundation

The work of The Arsenal Foundation and the partners and initiatives it supports have touched the lives of a great number of people in a variety of ways

The Arsenal Foundation's emergency Covid fund has helped Manor Gardens Welfare Trust provide food to Islington residents in need during the pandemic.

Manor Gardens' Felicity Ford tells us about it...

've worked at Manor Gardens Welfare Trust for five years but have been working in the voluntary sector for 30 years. I'm the Director of Fundraising and Development but during the pandemic my role shifted to being very hands-on as we moved quickly to set up a food distribution hub to meet the large and growing need in Islington at the start of lockdown.

All staff pulled together, largely from home, to contact our clients to check whether they could get their own food. Some were shielding or self-isolating and many others couldn't get out of the house due to illness or disability, and they certainly couldn't queue at the shops.

We also set up partnerships with other local charities, including Age UK, Cloudesley, SHP, Bright Start and Islington Mind. They provided financial support and we made sure their clients and other vulnerable people received food parcels. Working together made us more efficient and ensured a wide range of people received help.

We were very grateful to The Arsenal Foundation, who offered us volunteer drivers from the outset even though they were very busy helping out at all the community centres. We were encouraged to apply for funds that would give us extra supplies, and it was great to have the high-profile support of our local football club and to build on our partnership with Arsenal in the Community.

One day a big lorry arrived with pallets full of staple





items purchased by the Arsenal grant. It gave our supplies a big boost and was very gratefully received by all our clients.

We decided to finish the food distribution at the end of September 2020. Islington food providers all agreed demand was changing and we decided to support people to a more sustainable way of obtaining good food. We saw a change from the immediate effects of Covid restrictions preventing people getting out to extreme food poverty, joblessness and loss of income.

We worked with each client to support them to claim benefits and access long-term help. We also formed an alliance across the borough to promote the setting up of food co-ops so people could take charge of their own food provision, use free surplus food and prevent food waste. We have piloted pop-up food co-op schemes over the past couple of months to see what works best, and we hope local residents will be able to see the benefits and set up their own.

I'm very proud, as are all of our staff, that Manor Gardens was able to adapt what we do so quickly to step in and meet a very real need. We made a real difference to people's lives at a time when they needed us most and that will stay with us for a long time.

THEO WALCOTT

Last August we lifted the FA Cup for a record-extending 14th time. But it's not just our rich, illustrious history in football's oldest knock-out competition that is synonymous with the number 14. The man charged with wearing the Arsenal number 14 shirt after the departure of our record goalscorer Thierry Henry was 19-year-old Theo Walcott.

Theo had already been at Arsenal for nearly three years when he took over the responsibility of the No. 14 shirt in 2008, having worn the 32 shirt in his first few seasons (a number he finds himself in again back at Southampton).

the cup for a record-extending 14th time.

Speaking at the time, Theo said that 14 was actually his second choice: "I actually asked for No. 8 at first but Vic Akers said that Samir Nasri had it so I wasn't complaining there." he explained. "Then he said No. 14 was available so straight away I said 'I'll have that'.

"Thierry was my idol. He looked after me when I was first here. It was brilliant to train with him every day and watch

"For me it is best just to think of it as a number. But then I knew what to expect when I picked this number."

The forward went on to wear the number with great distinction over the following nine and a half seasons - more seasons than Henry had worn it for.

He scored exactly 100 goals in the shirt, to add to the eight he netted as a No. 32. His England career also took off after his change of number, scoring an unforgettable hat-trick away to Croatia just a month after making the change.

His Gunners career came to an end in January 2018, after he had racked up 397 appearances, and taken himself to joint 15th place on the all-time leading scorers chart for the club.

PROVIDING AN ASSIST

The recent easing of lockdown restrictions has enabled us to both restart our existing programmes, as well as begin some new initiatives. One of these is Assist, which is a new programme, developed and delivered as part of our PL Kicks Targeted Work. Assist is designed as an engagement and diversion project that will act as an early intervention for young people in Camden and Islington.

The programme is a strong strategic partnership between Arsenal in the Community, The Metropolitan

Police Service, Youth Offending Teams from Camden and Islington as well as the Targeted Youth Services from both boroughs, and involves young people who are either existing participants on our programmes, or referrals from our partner agencies. The participants come to The Hub for a weekly session and work towards accredited qualifications in Football Leadership and Conflict Resolution. These sessions are, as much as possible, peer led, which helps develop participants leadership skills, as well as the vital life skills of communication, team work, planning and problem solving. During the practical football

sessions, participants are able to put what they have learned into practice, as well as getting used to meeting and working with new people from different areas.

Here are the thoughts of some of our strategic partners on the programme:

That's true, I've not been out much at all really. I went out a couple of weeks ago to eat but apart from that we haven't been able to do much. It has been difficult to change country and team mates at a time like this, so sometimes it has been quite boring, as it has been for a lot of people. But it's really nice to be at this club and I like being at the training ground around everyone and my team-mates, so it's not too bad.

Did any of your family move over with you?

No, I've been here on my own. I had a friend here at the beginning but now I'm on my own again. I'm kind of used to it though, I've been alone for the last couple of years living abroad, so I don't mind it. It's just a shame that it's not possible to travel so that my family can't come and watch the games. That's a real shame but other than that it's fine really.

How about the rest of your week, do you plan your schedule around your training programme and the fixture list?

To be honest not too much, I tend to have the same routine from day to day. Every day is training in the morning then get home to rest and relax. It's more or less the same every day, obviously things are a bit different on matchdays, but normally the weeks are pretty similar.

And how does this routine compare to what you were used to in Madrid?

It's basically the same. I know some teams always go to hotels the night before every game, but where I've been I've been lucky that normally we can just sleep at home before home games and I always prefer that.

How far forward can you plan your career in the short-term? Is it difficult because you are on loan?

Yes it is difficult and it's hard to say what will happen, so that's why I try and not focus too much on the future to be honest. I just go day-by-day and now I am here I just want to finish the season as well as possible. That's all I am thinking of at the moment, there's no point looking further forward than that right now. At the end of the season we'll see what happens next, but for now

there is enough to focus on with the games. I have found before that if you look too far ahead, you can lose your focus.

How about your plans away from football for this summer?

I will go back to Norway, I always go back home when I get the chance, especially as I haven't been there for a long time. I had three days there over Christmas, but apart from that I've hardly been back for the last year and a half. So I'm looking forward to seeing everyone there again, hopefully the weather will be good and we can have a good time back at home. I like to relax, go out on the boat, have barbecues with friends, those kinds of things. It's where I grew up, so I have friends and family there and everything is close. I like to be on the sea, have a swim, enjoy the weather — a bit of everything.

You are only 22, but have you thought about what you want to do after your playing days?

No it's hard to say, at the moment I love being involved in football, so maybe I would want to keep being in involved in some way around the sport. I want to go back to Norway and live there, start a family and settle down there. So maybe I'll be involved in football in Norway, but who can say? Maybe when I'm older I will be tired of football! But I haven't really planned anything or started any coaching qualifications yet for example.

Is there anything you are looking forward to doing away from football when you retire?

Have some weekends off! No, nothing specific, but it will be nice to have some holidays in Norway where you can go skiing, because winter holidays in Norway are really special. Those are things I'm not allowed to do now, so yes it will be nice to do some 'normal' things that you can't do as a footballer. At the moment the plan is definitely to go back home and live in Norway, I like it there. But also I plan to travel a lot, see more of the world and get to experience places that you visit as a footballer, but never really see. We go to a lot of places, we are very lucky to travel, but really when we go somewhere all we see is the hotel room and the road to the stadium! It will be nice to see places more as a tourist.

y football journey started when I was just five years old. As a kid, I used to spend countless hours watching my favourite players on YouTube; Ronaldinho, Maradona, Messi, players like that. And ever since then I've been in love with the game. It's impossible not to be when you're watching them! I think my generation is quite lucky in that sense because we have access to so much footage online that would have been difficult to get in previous generations, so could watch my heroes at the click of a button really.

I can't thank my parents enough for their role in my love for football too. Without my mum, I wouldn't have ever played for my first local team, so I'm very grateful for that. She knew someone whose kid was already playing there and she wanted me to get involved from the moment I could join a club! I can't lie, things went pretty well there and after just a few months I had every local team and academy chasing me! It was pretty crazy and one of my first trials was with Chelsea, but in the end, they decided I wasn't good enough. I was really nervous on the day and to be honest with you, I didn't really know what was going on or what trials were all about. I was just trying to have fun; I was so

young at the time. Anyway, my parents told me that I had a lot of options and we ended up going to Fulham, who were next to Chelsea, and they wanted to sign me straight away.

I loved my time there and they were brilliant to me. Jack Henry-Francis was there when I joined the club too, so we've been together for a little while now and seen each other

grow up and develop as player. It's been class to play alongside him for so many years. But obviously, we both eventually switched to the red side of London. I remember my parents telling me that Arsenal had been interested for a little while during my third year at Fulham, but they explained that they didn't want to make the move so early because I was only a young boy and it was a big journey to Walthamstow every day for training, so they wanted to make sure I was ready for it. I was buzzing when they told me they were still interested because I genuinely grew up admiring so many Arsenal players.

I actually used to love watching Marc Overmars because I

was an out and out winger at the time and he wasn't the tallest player, but he was absolutely rapid and caused defenders nightmares with his movement. It made me a little nervous knowing that I had all these scouts coming to watch me, but eventually with my parents we decided that we couldn't miss out on this opportunity and that's when I joined The Arsenal.

As soon as I arrived I could already see the difference in facilities. Fulham were amazing for me, but it was far more local and there wasn't much space compared to Arsenal. I remember even being blown away by the reception and the canteen. All of the boys were so nice to me when I joined too. Growing up, I was quite a nervous and shy person, but they instantly made me feel welcome and like I was part of the group.

It was tough because I had to prove myself as a player all over again and I was a right winger at the time, but all of my coaches and team-mates were so supportive of me and I've loved every moment here since.

If I had to describe my style of play, I'd say that I'm a creative player and I'm at my best as a No. 10. I've also been working on my development as a left winger this season

and that works well for me because I'm guite pacey.

I try to pick the ball up in tight spaces because I'm very good at wriggling my way out of those areas and getting away from my man. I'm quite double footed too. In terms of players that I look up to, I really like Neymar and the role that he plays for PSG as a No 10. He is such an intelligent player to pick up really smart positions on the pitch to influence the game. He can drift both inside and outside and I really like that about him. One-twos around defenders, dribbling, shooting, incredible movement, he's got everything you want from a creative player.

As for the season so far, I always knew that it would be a competitive one in terms of minutes because there's a lot of boys fighting for pro contracts. It's been difficult for me at times because I just want to be out there and there have been a few stages in my under-18s career so far where I haven't been getting much football and I've just been training, and that put a dent in my confidence. But I've kept my head up and reminded myself to keep working hard because the opportunities will come. Since then I've been on a good run of games and doing everything possible to impress Ken and Greg. I'm ready to show what I can do.

Catching up with former Arsenal Academy players as they continue their pro careers away from Emirates

utton United stand a real chance of reaching the Football League for the first time in their history – and they are being inspired an ex-Arsenal Academy star who has become a legend at Gander Green Lane.

Sitting second in the National League, four points behind Torquay but with two games in hand, Craig Eastmond's team have seven games to make history -

only the champions are promoted, with second to seventh going into the play-offs.

An academy graduate in 2007, with West Brom's Kyle Bartley, and an FA Youth Cup winner, Eastmond played 10 games for the Gunners first-team, appearing in the Premier League, Champions League and both domestic cups before joining Colchester Utd in 2013 for £500,000, after spells with Millwall and Wycombe on loan. He played 68 times for Colchester, scoring seven times from central midfield but, after a brief spell with Yeovil, was without a club until Sutton United snapped him up in September 2015. He has subsequently been part of a hugely successful period for the Surrey club, famously reaching the fifth round of the FA Cup in 2017, where he had the opportunity to play Arsenal, and reaching the National League play-off final in 2018.

Courted by league clubs over the years, he has stayed loyal to Sutton and the 30 year old has now played 182 games for them, scoring 18 goals. Let's hope his commitment to the National League side earns them a place in League Two come the end of May.



VISITORS WEST BROMWICH ALBION

Promoted back to the Premier League last summer after two seasons in the Championship, West Bromwich Albion are set to make an immediate return to English football's second tier. The West Midlanders have been fighting an uphill battle against relegation all season, and although they have raised eyebrows with the odd shock result against some of the Premier League's leading lights — notably an amazing 5-2 win at Chelsea last month on their last visit to the capital — they entered this weekend needing something of a miracle to stay in the division with four fixtures of the season remaining.

Ironically it was immediately after one of those surprise results

— a 1-1 draw at Manchester City in mid-December — that the West
Brom board decided a change of manager was needed. So out went
Slaven Bilic, the man who had steered them to a runners-up spot behind
Leeds in last season's Championship, and in came veteran Premier
League campaigner Sam Allardyce — two and a half years after his last
job, at Everton. While there was some sympathy at the timing of Bilic's
dismissal, the fact was that West Brom were 19th in the table and had
won only one of their first 13 matches — and that at home to the only
team below them. Sheffield United.

It was pretty obvious that West Brom were going to find life tough at the top after heavy defeats in their opening two matches - 3-0 at home to Leicester, 5-2 at Everton - and despite Big Sam's reputation as a retriever of lost causes, a man who had never suffered relegation in a long and winding career that had even earned him a short stint as England manager, the shortage of top-flight quality in the squad - even with an injection of mid-season loan signings - has continued to hamper the club's survival ambitions, with points and wins proving just as difficult to come by under the new manager as the old one.

The Baggies' hopes of launching a surge to safety in the second half of the season appeared to be undone when they lost successive home games at the turn of the year to Leeds (5-o) and Arsenal (4-o), and although hope was renewed temporarily with a 3-2 win away to Wolves in their next encounter – Allardyce's first victory – it was not until April that they strung together back-to-back Premier League three-pointers, that astonishing 5-2 win at Stamford Bridge – in which Matheus Pereira and Callum Robinson both scored twice – followed by a 3-o home win over Southampton.

Another 3-o defeat against Leicester stopped Allardyce's men in their tracks, however, and the concession of a last-minute equaliser in a 2-2 draw at Aston Villa took more wind out of their sails before Monday night's 1-1 draw at home to Wolves — a result that left them ten points adrift of safety coming into this 35th round of matches and with the knowledge that defeat this afternoon would officially confirm their relegation from the Premier League.



MUTUAL Admiration

Swashbuckling striker KEVIN

CAMPBELL broke into the Arsenal firstteam as an 18 year old at the end of the 1987/88 season and after learning his trade with loan spells at Levton Orient and Leicester City, went on to play 228 games for the Gunners, scoring 59 goals. A big money move -£4.2m - to Nottingham Forest came in the summer of 1994 and after four years at the City Ground, a couple in Turkey with Trabzonspor then six hugely successful seasons with Everton, Campbell - by now 34 - joined West Brom in January 2005. His immense experience was instrumental in Albion rising from the bottom of the table at Christmas to stave off relegation that season, though they were relegated the following campaign, at the end of which Campbell left for Cardiff after playing 48 games and scoring six goals for the Baggies.









BETWEEN THE POSTS SAM JOHNSTONE

BORN Preston, 25/3/93

PREVIOUSLY Man United, Oldham (loan), Scunthorpe (loan), Walsall (loan), Yeovil (loan), Doncaster (loan), Preston (loan), Aston Villa (loan)

A former Man United academy graduate who never played a first-team game for the club, Sam's entire career was spent out on loan in the Championship and League One before he signed a permanent deal with West Brom in July 2018. replacing Ben Foster as the Baggies' first-choice goalkeeper. A former England youth international, he was called into the senior squad for the first time in March on the back of some eye-catching displays in his debut Premier League campaign.





THE EX-GUNNER KYLE BARTLEY DEFENDER

BORN Stockport, 22/5/91

PREVIOUSLY Arsenal, Sheffield United (loan), Rangers (loan), Swansea, Birmingham (loan), Leeds (loan)

Kyle began his professional career at Arsenal but made only one first-team appearance, in the Champions League away to Olympiacos, before joining Sheffield United then Rangers on loan and eventually sealing a permanent move to Swansea, where he struggled to make an impact in the Premier League. It was on loan at Leeds in the 2016/17 Championship that the central defender relaunched his career, prompting a move to West Brom, where he has become a key player and captain.





THE PLAYMAKER MATHEUS PEREIRA

BORN Belo Horizonte, Brazil PREVIOUSLY Sporting Lisbon, Chaves (loan), Nuremberg (loan)

A shining light amongst the gloom of West Brom's 2020/21 Premier League campaign, Matheus has provided plenty of Brazilian flair as well as a number of important goals, not least two in quick succession at the end of the first half in last month's 5-2 win at Chelsea. The left-footed attacking midfielder was recruited by the Baggies after a 2018/19 Bundesliga campaign with Nuremberg that ended in relegation, and he was a vital player in West Brom's promotion last year.





THE ADOPTED SCOT MATT PHILLIPS

BORN Aylesbury, 13/3/91

PREVIOUSLY Wycombe, Blackpool, Sheffield United (loan),

Born and bred in Buckinghamshire and a former England youth international. Matt declared his senior international allegiance for Scotland several years ago and has represented the country 16 times, most recently in September 2019. A single-season Premier League participant with Blackpool and QPR, the 30 year old winger is now in his third season at the top level with West Brom and looks set to experience a fourth career relegation from the Premier League.





THE SPEARHEAD MBAYE DIAGNE

BORN Dakar, Senegal, 28/10/91

PREVIOUSLY Brandizzo, Bra, Juventus, Ajaccio (loan), Lierse (loan), Al-Shabab (loan), Westerlo (loan), Ujpest (loan), Tianjin TEDA, Kasimpasa, Galatasaray, Club Brugge (loan) Signed on a half-season loan from Turkish giants Galatasaray in January, the strapping Senegal international striker has managed just three goals for West Brom since his arrival against Manchester United, Chelsea and last Monday against Wolves - despite regular selection. The 29 year old was the top scorer in the 2018/19 Turkish Super Lig with 30 goals - 20 for Kasimpasa and ten with Galatasaray after joining the

Istanbul club in mid-season and helping them win the title.





THE ENFORCER **DKAY YOKUSLU**

BORN Izmir, Turkey, 9/3/94

PREVIOUSLY Altay, Kayserispor, Trabzonspor, Celta Vigo

A Turkey international midfielder with 32 caps and a starter in each of the country's opening three 2022 World Cup qualifiers in March, Okay joined West Brom in February on a half-season loan from Spanish top-flight club Celta Vigo, where he has been on the books since joining from Trabzonspor in 2018. A feisty midfield ball-winner, he has started each of the Baggies' last 11 Premier League games and become a regular alongside Arsenal loanee Ainsley Maitland-Niles, who is ineligible for today's encounter against his parent side.





THE RISING STAR CONOR GALLAGHER

BORN Epsom, 6/2/00

PREVIOUSLY Chelsea, Charlton (loan), Swansea (loan)

A current England Under-21 international who has also represented his country at four other age-group levels, Conor came up through Chelsea's youth system and is still affiliated to the club though has yet to play a first-team game for them. The 21-year-old do-it-all midfielder had loan spells in the Championship with Charlton and Swansea before joining West Brom in another loan deal for the 2020/21 Premier League campaign, in which he has performed with distinction.





THE SUMMER SIGNING CALLUM ROBINSON

BORN Northampton, 2/2/95

PREVIOUSLY Aston Villa, Preston (loan), Bristol City (loan), Preston, Sheffield United

Republic of Ireland international Callum joined West Brom from Sheffield United in a swap deal involving Chris Burke last September after spending the second half of the promotionwinning 2019/20 campaign on loan at The Hawthorns. He started this season as a regular but had fallen out of favour until he came on as a substitute against Chelsea last month and scored twice in a 5-3 win - as he had in a 3-3 home draw against the Blues back in September.



THE BOSS SAM ALLARDYCE

BORN October 19, 1954 in Dudley PREVIOUSLY Limerick (1991-92), Preston (1992), Blackpool (1994-96), Notts County (1997-99), Bolton (1999-2007), Newcastle (2007-08), Blackburn (2008-10), West Ham (2011-15), Sunderland (2015-16), England (2016), Crystal Palace (2016-17), Everton (2017-18)

'Big Sam' was appointed in December, The Hawthorns thus becoming the eighth Premier League residence for the 66-year-old. Widely renowned for an idiosyncratic managerial style that has served both him and several clubs well, most prominently Bolton Wanderers, he also spent four years at West Ham and the briefest of spells as manager of England, which lasted just one game in 2016. He then managed Crystal Palace and Everton.

There are five players with Arsenal links in the West Brom squad. Ainsley Maitland-Niles is currently on loan, Kieran Gibbs had 10 seasons in the first team at Emirates, Kyle Bartley and Semi Ajayi were under-23 players for us earlier this decade - Bartley playing one first-team game. And Hal Robson-Kanu was a schoolboy striker with us.

Fred Everiss - mentioned as Albion's manager when they played Arsenal in the featured 'First Impression' picture - is technically English football's longest-serving manager. He was at the helm for 46 years between 1902 and 1948. Much of his combined secretary-manager role was however reported to be administrative with the club directors tending to pick the team.

Connor Gallagher played both legs in Chelsea's 2017/18 FA Youth Cup final 7-1 aggregate win over Arsenal, for whom Emile Smith Rowe and Bukayo Saka played in both matches.







FIRST IMPRESSION

Reproducing the oldest picture in our archives featuring today's opponents.

Two of the country's top teams do battle at The Hawthorns on September 14, 1932 in a match which saw the spoils shared in a 1-1 draw, David Jack scoring for the Gunners, Joe Carter for the hosts.

The picture shows West Brom's William 'Ginger' Richardson bearing down on Frank Moss in the Arsenal goal but the legendary Gunners captain Eddie Hapgood looks to have the situation under control in front of the 45,038 supporters.

It was little surprise that there was a big early season crowd with Albion having won their first four league games of the season and this draw kept them top of the Division One table. And the visitors were a big draw, having won the league title in 1930/31 and finished second the previous season with Albion sixth. The Gunners would go one place better this season, Herbert Chapman's team winning their second league title, while Fred Everiss's Albion improved their position, finishing fourth.■

SCOUTING REPORT

am Allardyce has never previously been relegated from the Premier League, a record which seems likely to end this season. There has, however, been an improvement in the last few weeks, with a 5-2 win at Chelsea followed by a 3-o victory over Southampton. There are elements of the direct approach that Allardyce has become renowned for over the years, but also an emphasis upon getting technical players into dangerous positions.

Goalkeeper Sam Johnstone has probably been the Baggies' best performer this season, which says much about the type of campaign his side has endured. Allardyce has decided

upon a relatively settled back four, however - the only debate is whether Dara O'Shea or Semi Ajayi plays alongside former Gunner Kyle Bartley, who skippers the side from centre back.

Darnell Furlong and Conor Townsend are both naturally attack-minded full-backs, but Allardyce has asked them to play more cautious roles, and West Brom did enjoy a run in February and March of conceding only three goals in six matches, in stark contrast from their defensive performances for much of the campaign. Allardyce has sometimes switched to a five-man defence, including for the shock win at Chelsea, but has tended to stick to 4-4-1-1.

Allardyce generally depends on a couple of good January signings when trying to rescue a club from relegation, and the greatest change has been in the centre of midfield. Turkish holding player Okay Yokuslu, on loan from Celta Vigo, has been excellent in terms of winning possession and distributing it effectively, while a more familiar loanee, Ainsley Maitland-Niles, has been exceptional in central midfield. Yet another loanee, Conor Gallagher, is likely to replace him

The star man is Brazilan Matheus Pereira, sometimes moved to the right if Allardyce plays 5-4-1 or 4-5-1, but most comfortable in a No 10 role, finding pockets of space and shooting dangerously from the edge of the box. He's scored four goals in his last four games, including two penalties, and is also excellent at scoring from free-kicks. He leads the side's goalscoring and assisting charts this season.

The right-wing spot should go to Matt Phillips, who was outstanding in the recent 3-o victory over Southampton and is a classic winger who bursts forward powerfully on the break. On the left, Callum Robinson is a converted striker offering speed and good movement, although he's struggled to score in this season's Premier League. Peculiarly, four of his five goals have come in the two matches against Chelsea, which underlines the fact he's most comfortable on the break against sides who play high up the pitch.

Up front, another loanee Mbaye Diagne is a classic Allardyce centre forward, and old-fashioned physical No. 9 who thrives on crosses. His first goal for the club, against Manchester United, featured him almost jumping over Victor Lindelof to head the ball home, and that type of approach play certainly plays to his strengths. He's only netted two goals since, however.


FIRST HALF

After five minutes, we scored our fastest goal in the Premier League this season. A wonderful pass from David Luiz found Hector Bellerin on the right. His cross wouldn't fall for Pierre-Emerick Aubameyang, but the ball fell straight to Mohamed Elneny on the edge of the area, and he fired his first ever Premier League goal past Martin Dubravka. Mat Ryan touched over a looping Allan Saint-Maximin shot on 17 minutes, then punched away the resulting corner. Dubravka acrobatically palmed away Granit Xhaka's shot that was destined for the top corner. Elneny then saw a header cleared off the line by Miguel Almiron as we ramped up the pressure and David Luiz glanced a header wide - one of 13 attempts on goal for us in the opening half.

SECOND HALF

After the break Aubameyang acrobatically steered home a fine Gabriel Martinelli cross to double our lead and we frequently looked to exploit the open spaces on the counter. Bellerin raced away on one such attack, only to see his shot blocked. But we had to be content with just the two goals, despite playing the last few minutes with an extra man after Newcastle had Fabian Schar sent off for a reckless foul on Martinelli. We had done enough though to earn all three points and end a three-game winless run.

IT'S RAINING SHOTS

e couldn't be accused of being shot-shy against Newcastle last weekend – we racked up 13 efforts on goal in the opening 45 minutes alone – the most we have mustered in the first half of a Premier League game since beating Everton at home in February 2018.

And the attacking intent seemed to be infectious as well. In fact Willian was the only outfield player who didn't attempt a shot for us in the first-half at St James' Park.

The third of our attempts last Sunday resulted in our first goal. Mohamed Elneny's first ever Premier League strike, scored in his 66th game, and coming after five minutes and one second — making it our quickest of the season.


By full-time our shot total had reached 19, though just five of them were on target, compared to one shot on target from the hosts.

Pierre-Emerick Aubameyang had the most shots (4) of which the only one on target resulted in a goal — meaning he scored and assisted in the same Premier League game for the first time since July 2020, against Watford.

The other goalscorer, Elneny, was next with three shots with Granit Xhaka, Gabriel, David Luiz and Hector Bellerin all attempting two shots each, and Calum Chambers, Martin Odegaard, Dani Ceballos and Gabriel Martinelli taking one each.

Having ten players try their luck on goal is certainly an indication of the team looking to bolster its attacking threat, having scored only twice in the previous three games combined.

In total this season we have attempted 417 shots in the Premier League, ranking us ninth, but there has been an improvement in this area during the second half of the season. From the start of the calendar year we have tried 245 shots (ranking us fifth) as Mikel Arteta continues to add a cutting edge to his side.
